About the MDPL

The Manitoba Defensive Pistol League was created in 2006

to provide organization for defensive pistol competition in Manitoba.

Our goals are to create safe shooters, great competitors, and a expand on our strong shooting community.

We organize about eight matches each year. A match is usually 4-6 hours long, using about 100 rounds of ammo.

What is IDPA (Defensive Pistol)?

Defensive pistol as a sport is quite simply the use of practical equipment including full charge service ammunition to solve simulated "real world" self-defense scenarios.

Shooters competing in MDPL events are required to use practical handguns and holsters that are truly suitable for self-defense use.

No "competition only" equipment is permitted in MDPL matches since the main goal is to test the skill and ability of an individual, not their equipment or gamesmanship.


Action Shooting

What Do I Need to Compete?

MDPL matches typically require the use of a service type pistol or revolver of 9mm/.38 special or lager caliber.

Holsters used must be practical, safe and suitable for concealed carry.



A common service pistol or revolver such as a Beretta 92F, Glock 17/22, Sig 226, Colt 1911A1, S&W 686 or Ruger GP-100 carried in a common pancake style holster is all that is needed to be competitive in matches.

Equipment Checklist

- Reliable handgun 9mm or larger
- ▶ 3 speed loaders or magazines
- Suitable holster
- Concealment garment
- Good attitude
